Item 7.01 Regulation FD Disclosure.

On Friday, February 19, 2016, after the stock market close, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued its 2017 Medicare Advantage and Part D Advance Notice and Draft Call Letter (the Advance Notice) detailing preliminary 2017 payment rates and proposed policy changes impacting payment rates. CMS has invited public comment on the Advance Notice before releasing final rates on April 4, 2016.

The rate notice does not include several important elements needed to fully evaluate the impact on Humana's 2017 business, including the potential negative impact from changes in encounter data submissions on risk adjusted revenue as well as the final impact of FFS county rebasing. However, prior to the impact of the two items above, our preliminary analysis of the elements included in the Advance Notice suggest an increase of approximately 0.2% for its 2017 Medicare Advantage payment rates, compared to the published average industry estimate from CMS of an increase of 1.35%. The lower increase for Humana versus CMS' estimated industry average is primarily driven by proposed changes to the risk coding model as well as the impact of Star ratings for 2017.

In prior years the final impact of fee-for-service county rebasing has impacted the Company's rates in the range of (0.2%) to (0.8%) for Humana between 2013 and 2016. We are unable to determine the impact of the change in encounter data submissions on our risk scores, though we believe this to be a negative impact to Humana as well as to the industry as a whole.

The Company is carefully evaluating the potential impact of the Advance Notice and the temporary suspension of the non-deductible health insurance industry fee upon its growth in both its Medicare membership and its earnings for 2017.

Humana will be drawing upon its program expertise to comment on the impact of the Advance Notice and the related impact upon Medicare beneficiaries' quality of care and service to its members through the Medicare Advantage program.

The number of shares of Aetna common stock that our stockholders will receive in the Merger is based on a fixed exchange ratio. Because the market price of Aetna's common stock will fluctuate, our stockholders cannot be certain of the value of the portion of the merger consideration to be paid in Aetna common stock.

While the Merger is pending, we are subject to business uncertainties and contractual restrictions that could materially adversely affect our results of operations, financial position and cash flows or result in a loss of employees, customers, members or suppliers.

Failure to consummate the Merger could negatively impact our results of operations, financial position, cash flows and the price per share for our common stock.

If we do not design and price our products properly and competitively, if the premiums we receive are insufficient to cover the cost of health care services delivered to our members, if we are unable to implement clinical initiatives to provide a better health care experience for our members, lower costs and appropriately document the risk profile of our members, or if our estimates of benefits expense are inadequate, our profitability could be materially adversely affected. We estimate the costs of our benefit expense payments, and design and price our products accordingly, using actuarial methods and assumptions based upon, among other relevant factors, claim payment patterns, medical cost inflation, and historical developments such as claim inventory levels and claim receipt patterns. We continually review estimates of future payments relating to benefit expenses for services incurred in the current and prior periods and make necessary adjustments to our reserves, including premium deficiency reserves, where appropriate. These estimates, however, involve extensive judgment, and have considerable inherent variability because they are extremely sensitive to changes in claim payment patterns and medical cost trends, so any reserves we may establish, including premium deficiency reserves, may be insufficient.

If we fail to effectively implement our operational and strategic initiatives, including our Medicare initiatives, our state-based contracts strategy, and our participation in the new health insurance exchanges, our business may be materially adversely affected, which is of particular importance given the concentration of our revenues in these products.

If we fail to properly maintain the integrity of our data, to strategically implement new information systems, or to protect our proprietary rights to our systems, our business may be materially adversely affected.

If we are unable to defend our information technology security systems against cybersecurity attacks or prevent other privacy or data security incidents that result in security breaches that disrupt our operations or in the unintended dissemination of sensitive personal information or proprietary or confidential information, we could be exposed to significant regulatory fines or penalties, liability or reputational damage, or experience a material adverse effect on our results of operations, financial position, and cash flows.

Our business may be materially adversely impacted by the adoption of a new coding set for diagnoses.

We are involved in various legal actions and governmental and internal investigations, any of which, if resolved unfavorably to us, could result in substantial monetary damages or changes in our business practices. Increased litigation and negative publicity could increase our cost of doing business.

As a government contractor, we are exposed to risks that may materially adversely affect our business or our willingness or ability to participate in government health care programs.

The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act and The Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 could have a material adverse effect on our results of operations (including restricting revenue, enrollment and premium growth in certain products and market segments, restricting our ability to expand into new markets, increasing our medical and operating costs by, among other things, requiring a minimum benefit ratio on insured products, lowering our Medicare payment rates and increasing our expenses associated with a non-deductible health insurance industry fee and other assessments); our financial position (including our ability to maintain the value of our goodwill); and our cash flows.

Our participation in the new federal and state health insurance exchanges, which entail uncertainties associated with mix, volume of business and the operation of premium stabilization programs, which are subject to federal administrative action, could adversely affect our results of operations, financial position, and cash flows.

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Our business activities are subject to substantial government regulation. New laws or regulations, or changes in existing laws or regulations or their manner of application, including reductions in Medicare Advantage payment rates, could increase our cost of doing business and may adversely affect our business, profitability, financial condition, and cash flows.

Any failure by us to manage acquisitions, divestitures and other significant transactions successfully may have a material adverse effect on our results of operations, financial position, and cash flows.

If we fail to develop and maintain satisfactory relationships with the providers of care to our members, our business may be adversely affected.

Our pharmacy business is highly competitive and subjects us to regulations in addition to those we face with our core health benefits businesses.

Changes in the prescription drug industry pricing benchmarks may adversely affect our financial performance.

If we do not continue to earn and retain purchase discounts and volume rebates from pharmaceutical manufacturers at current levels, our gross margins may decline.
